Now is the time to start your spring garden! Below are planting dates for some early spring crops. Vegetable Crop	Earliest Date
Peas, Spinach	March 1
Collards, Onions (sets), Radishes, Turnips, Rhubarb (crowns), Parsnips	March 10
Asparagus, Beets, Potatoes	March 15
Carrots, Chard, Kale, Parsley, Kohlrabi	March 20
Cabbage, Lettuce	March 25
Broccoli (plants), B. Sprouts (plants), Cauliflower (plants), Celery	April 5

Don't Work Wet Soil



Resist the temptation to work any soil if it is wet. Doing so destroys the structure of the soil resulting in clods that may not break down all summer. To determine if a soil is too wet to work, grab a handful and squeeze. If water comes out, it is much too wet. Even if no water drips out, it still may not be dry enough to work. Push a finger into the soil you squeezed. If it crumbles, it is dry enough, but if your finger just leaves an indentation, more time is needed. Be sure to take your handfuls of soil from the depth you plan to work the soil because deeper soils may contain more moisture than the surface.

If there is a small area that you wish to plant in a few weeks and it much too wet to work, try tarping the area during wet weather and uncovering when it is dry. This will allow the soil to dry enough to work by the time you are ready to plant.

#### **Cover Crops**



Cover crops aren't just for farm fields. Home gardeners can plant cover crops before or after harvest or in unused areas. Healthy soil is essential for healthy plants and using cover crops in the home garden is one way to promote soil health.

#### Benefits of cover crops

Cover crops improve soil structure, draw up nutrients from deep in the soil, and increase soil fertility. They also suppress weeds, create habitat for beneficial insects, and increase biodiversity. Crimson clover and cowpeas are legume cover crops that take nitrogen from the air and convert it to a form that future plants can use as nutrients.
